



**AUGUST 10th LAURENCE, ARCHDEACON AND MARTYR** (Latin: Laurentius, lit. "laurelled"; c.225-258) was one of the seven deacons of ancient Rome under Pope Sixtus II that were martyred during the persecution of Emperor Valerian in 258.

A well-known legend has persisted from earliest times. As Archdeacon in Rome, St. Laurence was charged with the responsibility for the material goods of the Church and the distribution of alms to the poor. When the prefect of Rome demanded that St Laurence turn over the riches of the Church, St Laurence asked for three days to gather together the wealth of the Church. He worked swiftly to distribute as much Church property to the poor as possible, so as to prevent its being seized by the prefect. On the third day, at the head of a small delegation, he presented himself to the prefect, and when ordered to give up the treasures of the Church he presented the poor, the crippled, the blind and the suffering, and said these were the true treasures of the Church. One account records him declaring to the prefect, "The Church is truly rich, far richer than your emperor." The prefect was so angry that he had a gridiron prepared, with coals beneath it, and had Laurence's body placed on it (hence St Laurence's association with the gridiron). After the martyr had suffered the pain for a long time, the legend concludes, he made his famous cheerful remark, "I'm well done. Turn me over!" From this derives his patronage of cooks and chefs.

**AUGUST 12th CHARLES INGLIS, BISHOP** (1734 - 24 February 1816) was born in 1734, the son of a priest, the Revd Archibald Inglis, the rector of Glencolmcille, Donegal, Ireland. In 1758 he was ordained as a priest in London and spent several years in Delaware before moving to Trinity Church in New York in 1765.

Following the British occupation of New York in 1777, Inglis was promoted from curate to rector of Trinity Church. As a Loyalist, it is recorded that Inglis prayed aloud for King George III while George Washington was in the congregation. In November 1783, upon the evacuation of Loyalists from New York, Inglis returned to England.

On 11 August 1787, George III created the Diocese of Nova Scotia by Letters Patent, and named Inglis its first bishop, the first Church of England bishop in North America.

**AUGUST 13th HIPPOLYTUS, DOCTOR AND BISHOP** (170-235), was the most important 3<sup>rd</sup>-century theologian in the Christian Church in Rome, where he was probably born. He is described in the early Church, as a disciple of Irenaeus, who was said to be a disciple of Polycarp, who was in turn a disciple of John the Apostle. He is remembered especially today as the author of the Apostolic Tradition, one of the earliest descriptions of Christian worship, which shows a remarkable continuity in the content and structure of the liturgy.

**AUGUST 13th JEREMY TAYLOR, BISHOP** (baptized 15 August 1613 - 13 August 1667) was a clergyman in the Church of England who achieved fame as an author during the Protectorate of Oliver Cromwell. He is sometimes known as the "Shakespeare of Divines" for his poetic style of expression, and he is frequently cited as one of the greatest prose writers in the English language. e.g. This prayer which is included in the Book of Common Prayer page 599:

O God, whose days are without end,  
and whose mercies cannot be numbered:  
Make us, we beseech thee,  
deeply sensible of the shortness and uncertainty of human  
life;  
and let thy Holy Spirit lead us in holiness and righteousness,  
all our days;  
that, when we shall have served thee in our generation,  
we may be gathered unto our fathers,  
having the testimony of a good conscience;  
in the communion of the Catholic Church;  
in the confidence of a certain faith;  
in the comfort of a reasonable, religious and holy hope;  
in favour with thee our God, and in perfect charity with  
all men. Grant this, we beseech thee, through Jesus Christ  
our Lord. Amen.

## Cemetery Notes

Once again, it is time for the annual St. Peter's cemetery service. Parishioners who attend the service will notice that the cemetery is in great condition - thanks to our caretaker Mike Brazil and his co-workers. At this time the Cemetery Committee would like parishioners to consider ways in which they can support the maintenance and upgrading of this sacred place. Over the past few years costs have increased and currently we spend about \$4,000. annually on the cemetery. Funding for the cemetery comes from three different sources. First, from investment income earned in a Designated Trust Fund; second, from donations to the Cemetery Maintenance Fund; and third, from the sale of burial plots. In the last case, \$100. of every plot sold is added to the income side of the budget. Since investment returns are very low in the current economic climate, the major sources of income continue to be contributions to the Cemetery Maintenance Fund and plot sales. Therefore, the Committee appreciates very much memorial gifts donated by family and friends when a parishioner dies. Also, parishioners are encouraged to think about the needs in the cemetery as they plan the disposition of their estates.

The next major cost will be the erection of a new sign to replace the old one that is falling into disrepair. As indicated before in previous notes, the repair and restoration of grave stones is the responsibility of family members. Mike Brazil has many years of experience in this field, so please call him at 902- 368-7330, if you require his services. Mike also has expanded his business to include monument sales. Again, he can be contacted at the number given above if you wish to consult on the purchase of a monument. Finally, please contact Jack Stewart, if you wish to purchase a plot.
