GOING FORWARD

Dear Friends in Christ:

It is now possible for us to worship and to gather for receptions and meetings, and gatherings such as coffee hour and lemonade on the lawn without capacity limited or other public health restrictions. Please feel welcome to wear a mask, sanitize your hands, and keep a distance at your discretion.

The Sacrament is delivered in one kind at the rail.

The offering plate is available at the door of the Cathedral during the Sung Eucharist and after.

It is my intention to resume administering the common cup at the Eucharist in the Cathedral and All Souls Chapel. I assure you that, to the best of my knowledge based on Science and Experience, that there is no evidence of transfer of any disease through the Common Cup since the restoration of the Common Cup in the Reformation in 1549. Each Sunday and Weekday since then the clergy have continued to drink the remaining wine after the reception of the Sacrament. And the Actuarial Tables of the insurance industry do not suggest an overly unusual number of clerical illness or death because of this. And I have not experienced in my years of ordination since 1983 any illness related to my consumption of the wine after the Communion. This has been the experience of clergy and lay people of the whole Anglican Communion of over 70 million people. The withdrawal was due to an overabundance of caution in 2020. The Covid-19 pandemic has sadly instilled fear of the Common Cup with no reason.

When this restoration of the Common Cup occurs and the cup is offered, and you choose not to receive the wine, I ask that you fold your arms and remain at the rail to hear the words of administration.

Dr. Edgar E.G. MacDonald
May 21, 1942 - June 25, 2022

The death occurred quietly at the Provincial Palliative Care Centre, in the company of family, on June 25, 2022 of Edgar MacDonald of Winsloe, age 80 years. He was born in Arlington, PEI in 1942 to Laurence MacDonald and Beulah (Ford)

MacDonald. Loving husband of Lynn (Wilson), father of Craig (Keiko), Graham (Emmanuelle), and Allyson (Devin), and grandfather (Pup) of Charlotte, Rose, Isla, and Solomon. After completing a PhD at the University of Alberta in 1972, he took a teaching position at Memorial University in Newfoundland. In 1975, he returned to take a position at UPEI, where he taught until his retirement in 1999. From an early age, he was aware that family, sports, gardening, nature, reading and writing, and animals, particularly horses and dogs, would play an important part in his life. His reading and writing interests often involved Canadian politics, Canadian literature and history, education, family genealogy, and the environment. He enjoyed international travel and was an active member of St. Peter's Anglican Cathedral. After retirement, he played an active role serving on various committees at St. Peter's, where, in his role as Property Warden, he oversaw the construction of the new hall, and the historic renovations of All Soul's Chapel and the many updates to the cathedral, rectory and church house. Throughout his life, Edgar enjoyed a variety of sports including hockey, baseball, fastball, tennis, squash, badminton, and golf. Living on the hobby farm with his family was a great source of enjoyment for Edgar, and he noted Winston Churchill's observation that there is something about the outside of a horse that is good for the inside of a man. Edgar's siblings who are left to mourn include George (Karen), Gloria (Ron) Hickey, Sharon (Ray Howatt) Landry, David (Helen), and Dwight (Susan). He is predeceased by his mother and father, and brother Elwood. May God bless him and may light perpetual shine upon him. A wake will be held in All Soul's Chapel Tuesday, September 6 from 5:00-7:00 p.m., with a funeral to follow at 11:00 a.m. on Wednesday, September 7 at St. Peter's Cathedral.
