#### **GOING FORWARD**

#### **Dear Friends in Christ:**

It is now possible for us to worship and to gather for receptions and meetings, and gatherings such as coffee hour and lemonade on the lawn without capacity limited or other pubic health restrictions. Please feel welcome to wear a mask, sanitize your hands, and keep a distance at your discretion.

The Sacrament is delivered in one kind at the rail.

The offering plate is available at the door of the Cathedral during the Sung Eucharist and after.

It is my intention to resume administering the common cup at the Eucharist in the Cathedral and All Souls Chapel. I assure you that, to the best of my knowledge based on Science and Experience, that there is no evidence of transfer of any disease through the Common Cup since the restoration of the Common Cup in the Reformation in 1549. Each Sunday and Weekday since then the clergy have continued to drink the remaining wine after the reception of the Sacrament. And the Actuarial Tables of the insurance industry do not suggest an overly unusual number of clerical illness or death because of this. And I have not experienced in my years of ordination since 1983 any illness related to my consumption of the wine after the Communion. This has been the experience of clergy and lay people of the whole Anglican Communion of over 70 million people. The withdrawal was due to an overabundance of caution in 2020. The Covid-19 pandemic has sadly instilled fear of the Common Cup with no reason.

When this restoration of the Common Cup occurs and the cup is offered, and you choose not to receive the wine, I ask that you fold your arms and remain at the rail to hear the words of administration.

OCTOBER 10th PAULINUS, Archbishop (died 10 October 644) was a Roman missionary and the first Bishop of York. A member of the Gregorian mission sent in 601 by Pope Gregory I to Christianize the Anglo-Saxons from their native Anglo-Saxon paganism, Paulinus arrived in England in 604 with the second missionary group. Little is know of Paulinus' activities in the following two decades.

**OCTOBER 11th PHILIP OF CAESAREA**, appears several times in the Acts of the Apostles. He was one of the Seven chosen to care for the poor of the Christian community in Jerusalem (Acts 6). He preached and performed miracles in Samaria, and met and baptized an Ethiopian man, a eunuch, in Gaza, traditionally marking the start of the Ethiopian Church (Acts 8). Later, he lived in Caesarea Maritima with his four daughters who prophesied, where he was visited by Paul the Apostle (Acts 21).

## OCTOBER 13th EDWARD THE CONFESSOR was born in 1003.

He was the last Saxon king to rule (for more than a few months) in England. He is called "Edward the Confessor" to distinguish him from another king of England, Edward the Martyr (c 962-979), who was assassinated (presumably by someone who wished to place Edward's younger half-brother on the throne), and who came to be regarded as a martyr for the faith. In Christian biographies, the term "confessor" is often used to denote someone who has borne witness to the faith by his life, but who did not die as a martyr.

He died on 5 January 1066, leaving no offspring; and after his death, the throne was claimed by his wife's brother, Harold the Saxon, and by William, Duke of Normandy. William defeated and slew Harold at the Battle of Hastings (14 October 1066), and thereafter the kings and upper classes of England were Norman-French rather than Anglo-Saxon. Edward is remembered, not on the day of his death, but on the anniversary of the moving ("translation") of his corpse to a new tomb, a date which is also the anniversary of the eve of the Battle of Hastings, the end of Saxon England.
