GOING FORWARD

Dear Friends in Christ:

While it is now possible to worship and to gather for meetings and coffee et cetera without capacity limits or masks in the Cathedral, please continue to sanitize your hands, to wear a mask or continue social distancing at your discretion. Please consider wearing a mask when moving in the aisle.

The Offering Plate will continue to be available by the door of the Cathedral.

The Sacrament will be delivered in one kind at the rail, but it is my intention to restore the common cup at the Eucharist in the Cathedral and all Souls' Chapel. I can assure you that to the best of my knowledge, there is no evidence of the transfer of any disease through the use of the common cup since it was introduced at the time of the Reformation of 1549. Each Sunday since I was ordained in 1983, I have, Sunday by Sunday and day by day, consumed any wine left over, after everyone present consumed the wine from the common cup, as have the clergy throughout the Anglican Communion, these many years, with no evidence of resulting illness. Of course, you may continue to receive in only one kind. The cup will be offered. You are not obliged to consume the wine.

Annual Requiem in Cemetery

Our annual parish Requiem Mass in the cemetery will take place on Sunday, August 7. On that day, the 10 a.m. service will be held at our St Peter's Cemetery on St Peter's Road (across from Fair Isle Ford) rather than here in the Cathedral. The celebrant will be Father Peter Harris.

JULY 25th JAMES THE APOSTLE was one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus, and traditionally considered the first apostle to be martyred. The son of Zebedee and Salome, James is styled "The Greater" to distinguish him from the Apostle James "the Less", who was probably shorter of stature. We know nothing of St. James's early life. He was the brother of John, the beloved disciple, and probably the elder of the two. He is described as one of the first disciples to join Jesus. The Synoptic Gospels state that James and John were with their father by the seashore when Jesus called them to follow him. [Matt. 4:21-22][Mk. 1:19-20] James was one of only three apostles whom Jesus selected to bear witness to his Transfiguration. James and his brother had fiery tempers and wanted to call down fire on a Samaritan town, for not welcoming Christ, but were rebuked by him [Lk 9:51-6], so they were called "Sons of Thunder".

The Acts of the Apostles records that "Herod the king" had James executed by sword. He is the only apostle whose martyrdom is recorded in the New Testament. He is, thus, traditionally believed to be the first of the twelve apostles martyred for his faith. His remains have been venerated at the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, in Northern Spain since the 9th Century. The Way, *Camino*, of Saint James, to Compostela continues to be a route of pilgrimage.

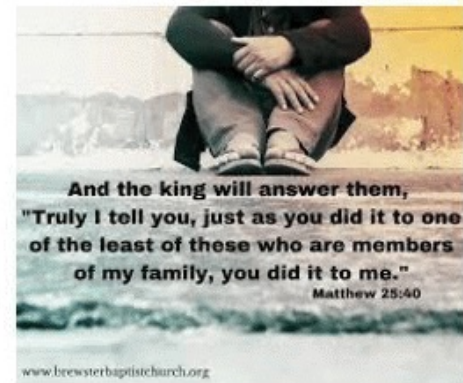
JULY 26th ANNE, MOTHER OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY of David's house and line, was the mother of the Virgin Mary and grandmother of Jesus Christ, according to apocryphal Christian tradition. Anne's name and that of her husband Joachim come only from New Testament apocrypha, of which the Protoevangelium of James (written around 150) seems to be the earliest that mentions them.

JULY 29th OLAF, KING AND MARTYR also called Olaf Haraldsson. The son of King Harald Grenske of Norway, he spent most of his youth as a Norse raider until 1010 when he was baptized at Rouen. In 1013, he journeyed to England and offered his services to King Ethelred against the invading Danes. Returning home in 1015 after succeeding to the throne, he embarked upon a war to free Norway from the domination of the Danes and the Swedes, defeating Earl Sweyn at Nesje in 1016. He also immediately requested that missionaries be sent from England to advance the Christianization of Norway. Owing to the harsh nature of his rule, he faced a rebellion of nobles in 1029. Through the aid of the formidable King Canute of Denmark, the rebels overthrew him and drove him in to exile in Russia. Olaf returned in 1031 but was slain in battle at Stiklestad, Norway, on July 29. While neither popular nor considered especially holy during his lifetime, Olaf was soon revered after death owing to reports of miracles occurring at his tomb. .

JULY 29th WILLIAM WILBERFORCE (24 August 1759 - 29 July 1833) was an English politician, philanthropist, and a leader of the movement to abolish the slave trade. A native of Kingston upon Hull, Yorkshire, he began his political career in 1780, eventually becoming the independent Member of Parliament for Yorkshire (1784-1812). A lifelong member of the Church of England, in 1785, he was moved to take his faith in Christ more seriously, which resulted in major changes to his everyday life.

In 1787, he came into contact with Thomas Clarkson and a group of anti-slave-trade activists, including Granville Sharp, Hannah More, Charles Middleton and John Newton. He headed the parliamentary campaign against the British slave trade for twenty years until the passage of the Slave Trade Act of 1807.

In later years, Wilberforce supported the campaign for the complete abolition of slavery, and continued his involvement after 1826, when he resigned from Parliament because of his failing health. That campaign led to the Slavery Abolition Act 1833, which abolished slavery in most of the British Empire; Wilberforce died just three days after hearing that the passage of the Act through Parliament was assured. He was buried in Westminster Abbey, close to his friend and fellow abolitionist, the Prime Minister, William Pitt.
