Concert-goers will hear both nostalgic songs and contemporary choral pieces that will appeal to all ages. Following the concerts, a reception will be provided for guests to enjoy a light lunch while viewing artwork pieces inspired by Matthew Gawronski's song "Imago Dei", one of the featured choral pieces. A portion of the ticket sales will go to the two schools' art and music programs.

MAY 26th AUGUSTINE OF CANTERBURY (born first third of the 6th century - died probably 26 May 604) was a Benedictine monk who became the first Archbishop of Canterbury in the year 597. He is considered the "Apostle to the English" and a founder of the English Church.

Augustine was the prior of a monastery in Rome when Pope Gregory the Great chose him in 595 to lead a mission, usually known as the Gregorian mission, to Britain, to Christianize King Æthelberbt and his Kingdom of Kent from Anglo-Saxon paganism. Kent was probably chosen because Æthelberbt had married a Christian princess, Bertha, daughter of Charibert 1, the King of Paris, who was expected to exert some influence over her husband. Before reaching Kent, the missionaries had considered turning back, but Gregory urged them on, and in 597, Augustine landed on the Isle of Thanet and proceeded to Æthelberbt's main town of Canterbury.

King Æthelberbt converted to Christianity and allowed the missionaries to preach freely giving them land to found a monastery outside the city walls. Augustine was consecrated as a bishop and converted many of the king's subjects, including thousands during a mass baptism on Christmas Day in 597. Pope Gregory sent more missionaries in 601, along with encouraging letters and gifts for the churches, although attempts to persuade the native Celtic bishops to submit to Augustine's authority failed. Roman bishops were established at London and Rochester in 604, and a school was founded to train Anglo-Saxon priests and missionaries. Augustine also arranged the consecration of his successor, Laurence of Canterbury. The archbishop

probably died in 604 and was soon revered as a saint. He is depicted in the painting on the wall in the chapel nave on the Gospel side next to the sanctuary,

MAY 27th BEDE (672/3-26May 735) was an English monk at the monastery of St. Peter and its companion monastery of St Paul in the Kingdom of Northumbria.. He is well known as an author and scholar, and his most famous work, Ecclesiastical History of the English People gained him the title "The Father of English History".

In 1899, Pope Leo XIII declared him a Doctor of the Church; he is the only native of Great Britain to achieve this designation: Anselm of Canterbury, also a Doctor of the Church, was originally from Italy. Bede was moreover a skilled linguist and translator, and his work made the Latin and Greek writings of the early Church Fathers much more accessible to his fellow Anglo-Saxons, which contributed significantly to English Christianity. Bede's monastery had access to an impressive library, which included works by Eusebius, Orosius, and many others.

It Remains For Me to Say

The Memoirs of Archbishop Harold Lee Nutter edited by his son Andrew with a foreword by David Adams Richards.

A New Brunswick Anglican Archbishop with generational ties to PEI recorded his memoirs for the Provincial Archives of NB in 1992. He married Islander Edith Carew and for many years in the 50s and 60s the family summered at their cottage on the North River in Charlottetown.

Harold Lee Nutter was born in the small New Brunswick village of Welsford. His mother died of tuberculosis when he was nine. Unlike other boys of his age, interested in hunting and fishing, Harold began studying Greek at the age of twelve. His father, who ran the village grocery store, found his son's unusual interest difficult to explain to fellow villagers. The Archbishop was sounding alarm bells in the later part of his episcopate over the wayward and woke direction of his beloved church. His writings now seem prescient. His son, Andrew, was ordained here in St Peter's Cathedral. The book is now available from St Peter's Cathedral Office at \$28.
