MAY 1st SAINT PHILIP AND SAINT JAMES Philip seems to have been an enthusiastic person. He was the one who brought his friend Nathanael to Jesus, insisting to Nathanael that he had found the person about whom Moses had written. Some years later it was Philip who made arrangements, with the help of Andrew, to have a group of Greek Gentiles brought to Jesus. Philip the apostle is not to be confused with the deacon Philip of Acts 8, who preached in Samaria and baptized the Ethiopian, although some writers say that they are the same person. Philip also had a practical, down-to-earth mind. He was the apostle who commented that it would take a considerable amount of money to feed a crowd of more than 5,000 hungry men, women, and children. It was Philip who asked to see the Father when Jesus spoke about him at the Last Supper.

James was the son of Alphaeus and seems to have been born in Caesarea. He is mentioned less frequently in the New Testament than Philip is. Sometimes James is called the Less, which might be a hint that he was younger than the other apostle named James.

After Jesus' death, James continued to preach the Gospel and is believed to have become the first bishop of Jerusalem. Assuming that James and the first bishop of Jerusalem are one and the same person, then he met his death as a martyr in that city about the year 62 A.D. Tradition identifies James as the author of the epistle associated with his name.

"Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful; and let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near." (Hebrews 10:23-25)

As a result of the Dream Board Ideas provided by Island Parishioners at the Diocesan Church Society Fall 2022 Picnic, there have been many discussions and conversations regarding the question of "Why?".

- Why do we want to welcome anyone into the church?
- Why is it important to enable the "ministry of all believers."
- Why is it important to uphold and encourage one another in Christ.

To help to find the answers to these "Whys," the Diocesan Church Society, of PEI, Anglican Clergy and People on the Island, with the support of the Diocese of NS & PEI will host a workshop with Author, Martha Tatarnic at St Paul's Church, Charlottetown, May 6th 2023, 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Martha is the Rector of St George's Church in St Catherine's Ontario. Her book "Why Gather? The Hope & Promise of the Church" addresses our questions along with others. Martha will share with us the real stories of real people revealing how God shows up, who the church really is, and why the church matters as a response to our hurting world.

In the midst of a global crisis, Martha found herself in a crisis of vocation, wondering whether or not there might be something else she could do with her life, other than serve the church. The church as a whole began asking questions of a similar and urgent nature. Why be together in Jesus' name? Does any of what we do as the church in gathering, in proclaiming, in serving, in being together, in not being together, does any of it matter?

Preregister at <u>Eventbrite</u> or by calling St Paul's Church Office at 902-892-1691 (*Financial help is available through the Diocese to assist with accommodations for those travelling a long distance.*) **MAY 2nd ATHANASIUS, DOCTOR AND BISHOP** (c. 296-298 - 2 May 373), was the twentieth bishop of Alexandria (as Athanasius I). His episcopate lasted 45 years (c. 8 June 328 - 2 May 373) of which over 17 were spent in five exiles ordered by four different Roman emperors.

Conflict with Arius and Arianism as well as successive Roman emperors shaped Athanasius's career. In 325, at the age of 27, Athanasius began his leading role against the Arians as a deacon and assistant to Bishop Alexander of Alexandria during the First Council of Nicaea. Roman emperor Constantine the Great had convened the council in May-August 325 to address the Arian position that the Son of God, Jesus of Nazareth, is of a distinct substance from the Father. Three years after that council, Athanasius succeeded his mentor as archbishop of Alexandria. In addition to the conflict with the Arians (including powerful and influential Arian churchmen led by Eusebius of Nicomedia), he struggled against the Emperors Constantine, Constantius II, Julian the Apostate and Valens. He was known as "Athanasius Contra Mundum" (Latin for Athanasius Against the World).

Nonetheless, within a few years of his death, Gregory of Nazianzus called him the "Pillar of the Church". His writings were well regarded by all Church fathers who followed, in both the West and the East, who noted their rich devotion to the Word-become-man, great pastoral concern, and profound interest in monasticism. Athanasius is counted as one of the four great Eastern Doctors of the Church.

MAY 4th MONNICA, MATRON (AD 331-387), was the mother of St. Augustine of Hippo. She is remembered and honoured for her outstanding Christian virtues, particularly the suffering caused by her husband's adultery, and her prayerful life dedicated to the reformation of her son, who wrote extensively of her pious acts and life with her in his *Confessions*. Popular Christian legends recall Saint Monica weeping every night for her son Augustine until his conversion.
