

CHARLES SIMEON of Cambridge, Pastor (24 September 1759 – 13 November 1836) was an English evangelical priest. Simeon received the living of Holy Trinity Church, Cambridge, in 1783. Simeon gained influence among the undergraduates of the university. He became a leader among evangelical churchmen, and was one of the founders of the Church Missionary Society in 1799. He also acted as adviser to the British East India Company in the choice of chaplains for India. According to the historian Thomas Macaulay, Simeon's "authority and influence ... extended from Cambridge to the most remote corners of England and her Empire ... his real sway in the Church was far greater than that of any primate."

HUGH, Bishop of Lincoln was born into a noble family at Avalon in France. He became a canon regular at Villard-Benoit near Grenoble. About 1160 he joined the Carthusians, the strictest contemplative order of the Church, at their major house, the Grande Chartreuse. With great reluctance, he accepted the invitation of King Henry the Second to come to England as prior of a new Carthusian foundation at Witham, Somerset. With equal reluctance, Hugh accepted King Henry's appointment to the See of Lincoln in 1186. As a bishop, his humility and tact, his total lack of self-regard, and his cheerful disposition made it difficult to oppose him in matters of Christian principle. His people loved him for his constant championship of the poor, the oppressed, and outcasts, especially lepers and Jews. He firmly refused to raise money for King Richard's foreign wars. Yet Richard said of him, "If all bishops were like my Lord of Lincoln, not a prince among us could lift his head against them."

MARGARET Queen of Scotland c. 1045 – 16 November 1093), was an English princess and a Scottish queen. Born in the Kingdom of Hungary Margaret was a very pious Christian, and among many charitable works she established a ferry across the Firth of Forth in Scotland for pilgrims travelling to St Andrews in Fife.

HILDA, Abbess of Whitby (c. 614 – 680) was a saint of the early Church in Britain. She was the founder and first abbess of the monastery at Whitby which was chosen as the venue for the Synod of Whitby in 664. An important figure in the Christianization of Anglo-Saxon England, she was a Mitred Abbess in several convents, including the double Abbey of Whitby, for both monks and nuns, and recognized for the wisdom that drew kings to her for advice. The prestige of Whitby is reflected in the fact that King Oswiu of Northumberland chose Hilda's monastery as the venue for the Synod of Whitby, the first synod of the Church in his kingdom. He invited churchmen from as far away as Wessex to attend the synod. Most of those present, including Hilda, accepted the King's decision to adopt the method of calculating Easter currently used in Rome, establishing Roman practice as the norm in Northumbria.
