On Monday January 20th Fr. Clem held a prayer service in the chapel. For those who were unable to attend due to the weather, here is a summary of his thoughts and prayers.

Today is not a day for rejoicing. Rather, it is a time for introspection. I don't know about you, but I thought having gone through the issues with Sadam Hussein, 9/11, Covid and the first Trump Presidency, I would have become used to these things as part of life, but, in truth, the only common thread is the uncertainty of the times. Today is one of these uncertainties. And I've come to realize that at times such as this the only thing I have to cling to is God. Now, in our need for finding a brighter future we could look at the musical "Annie", you know "the sun will come out tomorrow ". I prefer to look at the old hymn "This is my Father's world".

Verse 3 goes like this:

This is my Father's world,

O let me never forget

That though the wrong seems oft so strong

God is the ruler yet.

The irony is that today we also commemorate (saint) Martin Luther King day. He does provide us with both a sense of reality and God centered vision of a more equitable future.

Prayer: O God, as we commemorate the martyrdom of your servant Martin Luther King, may we look beyond the sorrow of today to the joy of a future as he dreamed about, for the sake of all your children for which your Son died and rose again, even the same Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns for ever and ever.

We thank thee [for] all of thy good and gracious gifts, for life and for health; for food and for raiment; for the beauties of nature and human nature. **We come before thee painfully aware of our inadequacies and shortcomings.** We realize that we stand surrounded with the mountains of love and we deliberately dwell in the valley of hate. We stand amid the forces of truth and deliberately lie. We are forever offered the high road and yet we choose to travel the low road. For these sins O God forgive. **Break the spell of that which blinds our minds.** Purify our hearts that we may see thee. O God in these turbulent days when fear and doubt are mounting high give us broad visions, penetrating eyes, and power of endurance. Help us to work with renewed vigor for a warless world, for a better distribution of wealth and for a brother/sisterhood that transcends race or color. In the name and spirit of Jesus we pray.

The words of the Centurion appeared to our ancestors so typical of Christian faith, that they made them a standing part of this holy sacrament. The priest about to receive the body of Christ into his own body strikes his breast and says, 'Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest enter under my roof: speak but the word, and my soul shall be healed'. But while it is the character of human faith to be content with whatever God is pleased to give, it is the character of divine love to give without measure. The worshipper says 'I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof'. But Christ says, as he said to Zacchaeus, 'Make haste, for I must lodge with thee today'.

Sometimes we need some road signs to help us see our way forward. That can be true of reading the Bible too. Have you ever wondered about the books of the Bible? What each one is about and how they came together?
