JULY 29th OLAF, KING AND MARTYR also called Olaf Haraldsson.

While neither popular nor considered especially holy during his lifetime, Olaf was soon revered after death owing to reports of miracles occurring at his tomb. He was greatly respected as a champion of Norwegian independence, and his shrine became the foundation of the cathedral of Trondheim, which was a popular place of pilgrimage during the Middle Ages.

JULY 29th WILLIAM WILBERFORCE (24 August 1759 – 29 July 1833) was a conservative member of the Evangelical branch of the Church of England, an English politician, philanthropist, and a leader of the movement to abolish the slave trade.

WELCOME

From Friday, August 1st, through Sunday, August 3rd, St. Peter's will be welcoming more than two dozen choristers to our parish as they participate in a Canadian Renaissance Music Summer School. The singers, who will come from around the Maritimes and further afield, including some of our own choristers, will be taking part in an intense two and half days of educational sessions focusing on music from the 1300's to the 1600's. The music they will be rehearsing will include many composers familiar to our parish --- Orlando Gibbons, William Byrd, G.P. da Palestrina, Orlando Lassus and Tomas Victoria --- as well as some who are not as well known.

While CRMSS has had similar events in Ontario and British Columbia for several years, this is the first time it's being held in the Atlantic region and the hope is that, if it is successful this year, it will continue in future and expand to a full week. This year's tutor team will be made up of Greg Skidmore and Sharang Sharma. Greg is a Canadian who studied in England and has lived there for a number of years, working as a free-lance singer, conductor and workshop leader. He has performed with such well known choral groups as The Tallis Scholars and The Sixteen. Sharang is Choral Director and Lecturer in Arts and Social Sciences at Huron University College in London, Ontario. He performs with a variety of Canada's best groups, including Taffelmusik Baroque Chamber Choir and The Elmer Iseler Singers.

Cemetery Sunday at St. Peter's

When is Cemetery Sunday?

August 10 we will hold our usual 10:00 eucharist service in the cemetery.

Where is the St. Peter's Cemetery?

Out St. Peter's Road heading east, across the street from the Fair Isle Ford dealership and beside Sam's Restaurant. The service takes place well back down the lane. You'll barely see us from the street but we're back there.

Where can I park?

You can park along the road and walk down the cemetery lane. Or, if you have reduced mobility, you can have someone drop you off down back or park down at the back of the cemetery.

What is different about this service?

The service is essentially the same communion service as when we're in the church. The choir is there and will lead us in music. The celebrant will read off the names of any parishioners who have died in the past year and we sing the beautiful Russian Cantation of the Departed. Other than that, it's the same lovely service but in a beautiful setting. A little more simplified with no organ.

What happens if it's inclement weather?

The service will be moved back to the church.

Do you need help setting up?

Good question. Feel free to ask either Father David or Vincen Salabarría, sacristan, if they could use some help.

Is there anything special to consider?

If it's a sunny day you may want to wear a sun hat or shawl or put on sunscreen as it can be bright that time of day. Otherwise, just come and enjoy!

from The Crown of the Year by Austin Farrer, weekly paragraphs on the Holy Sacrament. The alms for which your generosity is asked are nothing exterior to the sacrament, but a part of it. If you were living in the days of the ancient church, you would be bringing not money, but cakes of bread and flasks of wine. All would be placed upon the altar; part would be consecrated for the eucharist, the remainder would be given to the sick and poor. Now you bring money. But your money is still presented along with the bread and wine, and it still means the same thing. The offering is your offering; it is you yourselves who are laid on the altar to be consecrated, and to be made the body of Christ. Your gift is a token of yourself. I break the bread for the death of Christ, and we are all sacrificed to God in Christ's death, dying in him to our own will, and receiving Christ our true life in communion.
